## **OUR THOUGHTS ARE WITH THEM ...**

Words cannot even begin to describe the horrors that unfolded on Boxing Day 2004 when news broke of the devastating tsunami that swept across south-east Asia, causing the loss of over 150,000 lives, decimating families, and causing widespread structural and economic damage. Amongst those missing and presumed to have died in this tragic event were several thousand tourists enjoying what should have been a happy Christmas holiday and our thoughts are with their families at this time of great loss just as they are with all the local residents of the area affected by this freak of nature.


Amongst the worst affected places are Indonesia, the western coast of southern Thailand and the east coast of Sri Lanka. Fortunately, Malaysia, although near the epicentre, was largely spared due to it being shielded by Sumatra and although Penang was hit, Singapore mercifully remained largely unaffected. Although, perhaps, comparatively few bus enthusiasts will have visited these areas in the past, most will undoubtedly know of them through the influence of British buses, new and secondhand, which for several decades have been operated in such places as Sri Lanka, Singapore and Penang.

Pictures shown on television and in the national press have, amongst other things, shown several buses and coaches severely damaged by the tsunami, most of which are beyond repair and as part of the area's rebuilding programme there will be a dire need to replace these in the months ahead. In a bid to offer assistance, an Asia Bus Response campaign has been set up by a voluntary, co-ordinating group of UK bus professionals with the objective of sourcing 'decent mid-life buses' which can be shipped out to the worst affected areas of Sri Lanka and Indonesia to help them rebuild their transport network. As well as providing a means of transportation, Islamic Relief will arrange skills training for drivers and engineers in the countries of destination and will pay those people a living wage. Donor companies will be responsible for delivering buses to a UK departure point while Islamic Relief is co-ordinating and





sourcing funding for shipping, taxes, registration and licensing. It isn't about palming off elderly vehicles, however, as all the buses donated should be robust, high floor, low-tech vehicles (from minibuses to double deckers) which are capable of a few

years hard work. Asia Bus Response has undertaken to ensure that the buses dispatched fit the needs of the destination countries and is arranging for each bus to be independently inspected prior to shipping to ensure worthiness. With so much having to be put into place, mid-late March is the soonest likely shipping date and with the sea journey taking around six weeks it thus appears that it will be the middle of the year before the buses will first be used in their new homes

Within a week of the appeal being launched, no fewer than 65 buses had been
